Financial Update

Calvary recognizes that there are many ways that members contribute to our ministry, not all of which can be quantified in a budget. Calvary's ministry is carried out through the extensive time and energy of our Pastor, deacons, parish secretary, council, committees & members!

At the annual meeting, the congregation approved a 2025 budget totaling \$321,489, to be covered by the combination of donations, building use, cell tower, fundraising activities and the use of cell tower reserves for renovations. For the year to date ending May 31, we received \$95,125 in gross revenue, \$54,975 of which came from offering, and had total expenses of \$114,608, including a new roof for the parsonage and replacing the Boy Scouts trailer damaged by a tree.

Contributions from our members are what help Calvary to keep our ministry going. Contributions can be brought to a service, mailed, made on our website **www.longislandlutherans.org/donate** or through the Tithe.ly app.

On Sunday, June 29, Calvary's new pulpit was dedicated in worship!

Earlier this year, as the Worship and Music Committee began exploring meaningful ways to use existing memorial funds, Bob Munder and Mady Riedell generously came forward with the offer to make this gift.

Our new pulpit, also sometimes called an ambo, matches our existing baptismal font, which had been kindly gifted years ago by Paula DePaul in memory of her husband. Thankfully, we still had the original purchase slip and were able to match the style and color, from the very same manufacturer!

Our worship's guiding documents tell us, "The unity of the proclamation of God's word is reinforced when all the readings and the preaching are led from a single place of the word."

Vacation Bible School - Registration Continues




Every year, young people come together for a week of camp-style fun known as VBS - Vacation Bible School!

Bible in a Year - Mission Accomplished

Caitlyn Toback (Calvary's council secretary) and Brianna Santomassino committed to reading the Bible in one year, and they successfully did it! We are inspired by their dedication.

To celebrate, they joined Pastor Zach for a visit to the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in NYC. Located in Manhattan's Morningside Heights, it's one of the largest churches in the world and is known for its stunning Gothic Revival architecture.

Fun fact: Construction started over 130 years ago and it famously remains unfinished!





July Commemorations

July 1: Catherine Winkworth, died 1878; John Mason Neale, died 1866; hymn translators

Neale was an English priest who specialized in the translation of Latin and Greek hymns into English. Winkworth lived in Manchester, England, and devoted herself to translating German hymns. Almost all English-speaking hymnals include many of their translations.

July 3 Thomas, Apostle

Though frequently remembered as "doubting Thomas," this apostle also demonstrated a willingness to suffer and die with Jesus (John 11:16), and finally claimed the risen Christ as "my Lord and my God!" By tradition, he later worked as a missionary in India. Long commemorated on December 21, Thomas's celebration is moved to July 3 in agreement with ecumenical calendars.

July 6 Jan Hus, martyr, died 1415
Hus was a Bohemian (present-day Czech Republic) priest who spoke against abuses in the church, and was seen by Martin Luther as his predecessor in the reforming movement. He was found guilty of heresy by a council of the church, and burned at the stake.

July 11 Benedict of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Cassino, died around 540 Benedict is known as the father of the Western monastic movement. Educated in Rome, he went to live as a hermit, and eventually gathered a community of monks around him. He wrote a rule for living in monasteries that is used by Benedictines and adapted by others.

July 22 Mary Magdalene, Apostle Sometimes called "the apostle to the apostles" because she told them of her encounter with the risen Lord, Mary was a woman of Galilee who followed Jesus throughout his ministry. She was present at Jesus' crucifixion and his burial. July 23 Birgitta of Sweden, renewer of the church, died 1373
Birgitta married at age thirteen and had four daughters. Widowed at age thirty-eight, she gave all that she owned to the poor, and founded a community of monks and nuns led by a woman. Her work is continued today by the Society of St. Birgitta.

July 25 James, Apostle
James and his brother John were
the sons of Zebedee, fishermen by
trade before their call from Jesus.
He was the first of the twelve
apostles to be martyred, and his
death is the only one recorded in
scripture (Acts 12:1-2).

July 28 Johann Sebastian Bach, died 1750; Heinrich Schütz, died 1672; George Frederick Handel, died 1759; musicians

These three German-born musicians have done much to enrich the life of the church. Schütz was an early master who focused on settings of biblical texts. Bach wrote over 300 cantatas along with works for organ and instrumental pieces, and has been called the "fifth evangelist" for the way he proclaimed the gospel in music. Handel's great work, Messiah, is a setting of scriptural texts.

July 29 Mary, Martha, and Lazarus of Bethany

Friends of Jesus, Mary and Martha are remembered for the hospitality of their home that they offered him—Martha focused on serving their guest, and Mary on listening to him. Their brother Lazarus was raised from the dead as a sign of the greater resurrection to come.

August Commemorations

August 8 Dominic, founder of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans), died 1221

Dominic was a Spanish priest who saw the wealth of the clergy as a stumbling block for the church, so he formed a movement, the Order of Preachers (commonly called Dominicans) devoted to itinerant preaching and living in poverty.

August 10 Lawrence, deacon, martyr, died 258

As one of the seven deacons of the church at Rome, Lawrence was responsible for the church's financial matters and for the care of the poor. Asked by the emperor to gather the church's treasure, he presented a collection of orphans, lepers, and the like. The enraged emperor had him put to death.

August 11 Clare, Abbess of San Damiano, died 1253

A contemporary of Francis of Assisi, Clare and a growing number of companions established a women's Franciscan community, called the Order of Poor Ladies, or Poor Clares. She inspired other women to pursue spiritual goals.

August 13 Florence Nightingale, died 1910; Clara Maass, died 1901; renewers of society

Nightingale was born in England, and horrified her wealthy family by deciding to become a nurse. She led a group of nurses in ministering in the midst of the Crimean War, and worked for hospital reform. Maass, a native of New Jersey, was also a war nurse, and volunteered as a subject for research on yellow fever. She died of the disease.

August 15 Mary, Mother of Our Lord The church (including Martin Luther) honored Mary with the title theotokos, meaning "God-bearer," for her role in giving birth to the Son of God. Her song, the Magnificat, speaks eloquently of God's lifting the lowly and feeding the hungry.

August 20 Bernard, Abbot of Clairvaux, died 1153

Bernard, a Cistercian monk, was a man of great spirituality who wrote mystical works and criticized those whom he thought took an overly intellectual approach to the faith. He became an abbot, and wrote several hymns that are still beloved today.

August 24 Bartholomew, Apostle Mentioned as one of Jesus' disciples in Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Bartholomew's name is replaced in John's gospel by Nathanael, leading many to believe that the two are different names for the same person. Little is known about his work, though some traditions place him later in India or Armenia.

August 28 Augustine, Bishop of Hippo, died 430

Augustine was one of the greatest theologians of the Western church. A native of North Africa, he recovered from a debauched young adulthood through the influence of his mother, Monica, and Bishop Ambrose of Milan. Besides writing influential theological books, he served as bishop of Hippo, in present-day Algeria.


